Tech. Tip

Have you ever had a hard time getting a good burnish when tooling? Well we might just have a remedy for you.

Casing solution recipe: I teaspoon of tanning oil, 5 squirts of glycerin mixed into 1 cup of water.

I mix mine by the quart and even use it to case leather I am going to 'emboss' in the clicker. Remember, you still have to allow the leather to air dry before you start tooling, but your burnish will be better.
