

Departmental Exhibitors Rules And Regulations

The Association will have officers on the grounds and will use every reasonable precaution in its power for the preservation and protection of persons, articles on exhibition, livestock and property, but will not be responsible for loss or damage by theft, fire or otherwise.

Premiums And Awards

First premiums shall be designated by blue ribbons, second premiums by red ribbons, third premiums by white ribbons, fourth premiums by pink ribbons and fifth premiums by yellow ribbons.

Judging

Judges are selected from professionals or highly accredited amateur artists working within their field of expertise. Judging begins August 1 - 9am to Noon. Employees of the Hobby Hall Building are not eligible to judge.

Awards

Each division will have a Grand Champion - Best of Division Award given to the most outstanding entry of that Division. There may be one Blue, (1st), one Red (2nd) and one White (3rd) ribbon given in each class. Premiums will be awarded as listed for each division.

Other awards will include Honorable Mention and Special Awards

Excerpt from the Official RULES

The general rules (Rules and Regulations) governing all departments of the Fair are to be observed with a few additions.

1. Mail-in entries will not be

- accepted.
- 2. No entry fees will be charged.
- 3. All articles must be the handwork of an individual exhibitor. They must be finished within the last 2 years. No article can be exhibited a second year. SOILED OR OBVIOUSLY USED ITEMS WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.
- 4. Employees in the Hobby Hall Department are not allowed to enter articles for premiums.
- 5. ALL ITEMS WILL BE
 PLACED IN THE MOST
 SUITABLE CLASS. Each
 entrant shall be limited to ONE
 ENTRY PER CLASS, as to
 enter more would in effect be
 competing against oneself, i.e., 1
 doll house, 1 doll house accessory. Entries may be reclassified
 by staff or judges.
- All awards need not necessarily be awarded in each class at the discretion of the judge.
- 7. The Hobby Hall Department is mainly for amateur craftspersons to compete and exhibit their work. Anyone who sells more than \$2000 per year, who teaches or has a teaching certificate for that craft, or who demonstrates that craft where supplies or finished works are sold is considered a professional by the Western Washington Fair.
- 8. No pre-registration is required.
- All items placed on display must remain for the full length of the Fair.

2C chopped seeded watermelon

1C chopped Walla Walla Sweet Onion

1C chopped orange sections

In large bowl, stir together orange marmalade, cilantro, jalapeno peppers, vinegar, garlic and salt. Add watermelon, onion and orange; gently toss together until coated. Chill at least 30 minutes before serving. Makes 4 cups.

Book Review — Leder-Gilde E.V.

After purchasing this paper backed book I planned to write a book review, but my Leather Crafters & Saddlers Journal included two reviews — one by the world renowned **Stohlmans'** and one by the **Journal**. They both raved the book so I guess I'll give my one-half thumbs down review now.

This "soft" (not hard) cover publication offered many international known leather artists a chance to give a small look at some of each artist's work. The Leder-Gilde Inc. is a worldwide organization set up to arrange promotional shows and displays with one or more artists to attract media and public to trade shows, openings, etc. A future publication is planned in about three years with members that have been in the Guild for two or more years. Unfortunately, the pictures were too small to give any detail to aid the leathercrafter in pursuing the new, wonderful ideas shown. The faded background enlargements were too faded and often were covered by the foreground picture.

This book had 46 artists: Helmut Abbel, Todd Barber, Robb Barr, Bob Beard, Gisela Bendel, Rene Berends, Joss Remardo, Ralph Bleau, Attila Bogdan, Maria Bogdan, Bernhard Barkle, Paul Bumett, Deutsches Ledennuseum, Armin Dobstetter, Garry Greenwood, Reidun Handegaard, Hans-Ulrich Hemnann, Ute Jaeckel, Balu Ralf Knedlik, Tony Laier, Claudia Leig, Rex Lingwood, Peter Main, Marc Meyer; de, Goichi Mishima, Jun Nakahama, Nederlands Leder Museum, Hendrik Nijhof, Ehrhard Peter, Bettina von Reiswitz, Christine Roelle, Stephanie Rothemund, Josef Schachi, Herbert Schmid, Selim, Kiyoshi Shimazaki, Michael Sohr, Al Stohlman, Ann Stohlman, Peter Dr. Schnabel, Doris Strehl-Berends, Gerda Stroom-de Jong, Yumiko Takama, Alois Thaler, The Bear Gallery, GmbH, and Harue Yoshida

Each artist had a self portrait picture, statistics on date of birth, nationality, country of residence and year of entrance into leatherwork. There were people from the US, Norway, Mexico, Japan, Australia, Spain, Canada, The Netherlands, Italy, Switzerland, but most were from Germany — which is not a surprise from the German sounding title Leder-Gilde E.V. Since the text was reprinted on each page in English, German, and Japanese, there was little room to explain the artist or his work in any detail.

I own this book and consider it a collector's item, but only for the exposure to the ideas shown. Pick up your own copy at your local leather establishment or ask Bill Churchill or Bob Stelmack for a look at some of the most imaginative ideas (leather flowers, leather electric guitar body, three dimensional artwork).

KITCHEN KNIFE HOLDER

A holder (rack) for your sharp kitchen knives that is attractive and very easy to make. This is the type that will hang on the wall. The type that sits on the counter top is a little more involved. There are a couple of ways to get the basic knife rack:

- 1. Build one (instructions are included).
- 2. Buy one at your local department store.

To build a knife rack is quite simple and really does not involve that many tools. Naturally just like leather carving the more tools that you have the easier it is, so if you have a table saw and router it will be much easier. But you can also make a rack with a regular hand saw.

When you make the rack with the table saw or with a hand saw FIRST AND FOREMOST, WEAR YOUR SAFETY GLASSES AND OBEY GOOD SAFETY STANDARDS....

Materials needed:

- --2" x 6" board (at least 2 feet long). 2 each 1/4" dowels, 3" long
- --Finished plywood 7" x 18"
- --Wood glue
- --Small 3/4" finish nails
- --Leather spirit dye (the color you want to stain the knife rack)
- --0000 steel wool
- --One sheet each of medium and fine sandpaper

How to build the knife rack with a table saw.

Using a 2" x 6" board, Cut a piece 11 1/2" long. Set your blade at 1 1/4" high and set your fence for 13/32". cut the left side then the right side. Make the cut completely from top to bottom. Measure between the two cuts and set your fence and make the center cut. Then measure between the center cut and the outside cut. Set the fence at these new measurements and saw the two last cuts. You now have five channels for your kitchen knives. Cut another piece of the 2" x 6". This piece will be 2" x 6" x 1" which will make the bottom of the rack. This will make your rack 12 1/4" long ... long enough for your longest bread knife.

The next step is to glue the bottom (2" x 6" x 1") to the main part of the rack. Since this will be end to end grain, I usually drill two holes in the bottom through to the main part of the rack and insert the two dowels covered with glue, this makes your glue joint extremely strong.

Now cover the entire back of the rack with the finished plywood. Use wood glue and the small finish nails. Saw the plywood flush with the rack.

For those of you that have a router, it is nicer to shape both side edges and the bottom edge of the front of the rack.



Sand with medium and then fine sandpaper. For a beautiful wood stain, I use spirit leather dyes. You can mix them to get the desired shade and apply them with a wool dauber. When dry, I use 0000 steel wool (be sure and rub with the grain). Generally I use Johnsons paste wax for a finish but this would be the last step. On the back for hanging, I use the notched picture hangers (two of them, side by side)..

How to build the knife rack with a regular hand saw.

Materials needed:

- 1 each 1" x 2" x 8' board (be sure it is NOT warped).
- 2 pieces of finished plywood (this is for the front and back of the knife rack). Be sure and cut the plywood 13" long. The extra inch is for the bottom of the rack.
- The rest of the materials will be the same as with the first knife rack.

Using the 1" x 2" board you can make the knife rack hold as many knives as you like. If you want to hold more knives, just add more pieces of the 1" x 2" board to make more channels. With the 2" x 6" board, you are limited to a knife rack that will only hold five knives.

Saw the 1" x 2" board into 11 1/2" lengths. The number of pieces depend on how many knives you intend to put into the rack. Glue the first piece of 1" x 2" x 11 1/2" board flush with the edge of the plywood. Nail with finish nails if you like. Then 1/8" from the first 1" x 2" x 11 1/2" board, glue the second board (see example) and so on until you have enough channels for the kitchen knives that you have.

Measure and saw the bottom and glue, you can put dowels in now as with the first rack. (see the example for putting on the bottom). After you have all the channels on the rack you can now put on the final piece of plywood for the front. Follow the instructions for staining and finishing the rack as with

the first one.

If you want a fancy front for your knife rack go to your favorite craft dealer and buy a wooden plaque. It is all ready to sand and finish.

Now the leather

The design on the finished knife rack is from the **Craftaid #2510** by **Al Stohlman.** The letters are craftaid #2540. The words "**KUCHEN MESSER**" are German for Kitchen Knives. Included is another one with a MACAW. They are colored with felt tip markers and ball point pens.

After the colors are dry, I sprayed with Super Shene. When dry, I used Highlighter Antique. After the Highlighter dried, I again sprayed the entire leather with Super Shene.

Cement the finished leather to the front of the knife rack and you can also use decorative tacks around the edge of the leather. Now is the time to rub a coat of Johnson paste wax on all the wood that is showing and when dry, buff to a nice shine and put the two notched picture hangers on the back.
