


they are finished

(Editors note: Here is an encouraging letter from Robb Barr sent to the Puget Sound Leather Artisans Co-Op)

HOPE —FAITH—PRAYERS—& MIRACLES

To My Dear Friends & Family around the World.

It is with great pride and joy to be sitting here writing this letter to all of you.

As most of you know, back in 1996 I had six bypasses done on my heart. By February of 1997 I was back on the road teaching leather art and feeling pretty good. Then in November of 1997 I started to retain a lot of fluid in my body and at that time a pacemaker

was installed. I was home for two weeks and then back in the hospital in Bismarck. They could not get the fluid build up in my system to go away so I was flown to Minneapolis, Minnesota to the University Hospital to be worked up as a possible heart transplant recipient. They, at the University of Minnesota, could not get the fluid off and my

heart was getting very weak. Not only was I very ill but my spirit to go on living was going away. I did not care anymore whether I lived or died and was having severe bouts of depression.

My team of 27 doctors decided to install a heart pump that would make my heart work less. The pump

actually would take over and pump and do the work for my heart. I had doubts about this operation also and just wasn't sure what to do. Finally being told by a very good friend, "Hey look, it is either this or you will die", I gave the Dr. the okay to do the surgery. The pump was installed and the next day I felt one hundred percent better. Each day I got stronger and stronger. Within ten days I was up walking on the treadmill for 30

minutes at a time. I was told I would be on the heart pump for at least three months. By the end of the third week my Dr. came to visit me at 11:00AM and asked me how I was feeling. He then said,

"How would you like to receive a new heart today?" Well, I about fell over!

Three hours later, on February, Friday the 13th, 1998 I was in surgery. I woke up early on February 14, Valentines Day, with my new heart. What a Valentines Day gift, much better than roses.

On the 3rd of March I was released from the hospital. I am living in an apartment close by for at least the next

two months, as I must go back at least twice a week for tests to make sure my system isn't rejecting my new heart. Each day I get stronger and feel better. At the present time I have to take so many pills that it looks like a meal. I think I take over 40 pills a day right now but as things adjust to each other that will be lowered.



Hope — never left me. There was always the feeling of hope that something could be done.

Faith — in my doctors and in God was always there.

Prayers — were felt from around the world, from each and every one of you.

Miracles — of medical science and in God, knowing that through death I received life.

I was asked, "Whose heart did you get?" I do not know, it does not matter, it is my heart and I will handle it with love and care because it is a most precious gift.

I cannot thank you enough for your letters, cards, telephone calls and help you have sent in any way. Your most special gift to me has been keeping me in your prayers.

This letter is going out to hundreds of friends because I just cannot write everyone. Over the holidays and also with the cards and letters I have received some of you have been using old addresses for my sister and myself. So here are the correct addresses.





Although Bill is very new to the current electronic communication, he has a wealth of radio communication experience in the Air Force. Those of you who have access to the Internet and experience with computers, give Bill a few messages to let him experiment with email communication and give him a hand when it comes to "computer operation". Think back to those days when you first started to use a computer!

Terry's "Painting on Leather"

Terry Shinaberger gave a seminar on Painting on Leather. The seminar started of on a humorous note with the first demonstration using Tandy's Cova Colors and a 2 inch brush -- painting leather as you might paint the wall in your house.

After the laughter died down Terry showed many examples of leather painting on many types of leather (rawhide, leather splits, and top grain leather) strung in those "dream catcher" rings.



The technique that Terry uses is an opaque overhead projector, which we



all remember from our school days as the projector that would take a solid object (sheet from a book, picture, drawing) and project to a screen for the whole class to see.

Here you see an Indian that was transferred to leather with the help of the overhead projector.

Terry used a number of coloring aids to transfer her designs: marking pens, Tandy's Cova colors, pro dye, etc.



This article was prepared to capture the RULES for creating "traditional", true to form Northwest Indian Art Forms. These rules help separate the "traditional" from the "nontraditional" forms.

OVERALL Guidelines and Rules:

- The Larger lines (form lines) define the animal, usually black in color and are on the surface.
- Secondary lines or forms are

- usually red.
- · Tertiary lines or forms are usually blue/green.
- Relief forms are cut into the form lines to break a primary form's bulkiness (circles, oviods, "T's", etc.).
- · An oviod's center of circles

defining the "corners" are vertical aligned.

· Folding the half oviod over to form the whole oviod (future articles on details) – perform this on tracing paper.

OVIOD RULES:

- · Top is twice as thick as bottom.
- · Angular Ambiguity Thick to thin

at every turn

- Thickest area of the largest ovoid is the thickest line.
- Inner oviod ALWAYS floats and is closer to the top and is NOT centered.
- Eyelid line NOT across center and is above center and NOT centered.

"U" RULES:

- · Always thicker at the top
- Wider at the bottom
- Corners NOT rounded, more angular definition
- Always meets at the top and bottom of adjoining form.

"L" RULES:

- · Tapers to thin at ends
- Corners NOT rounded, more angular definition

"S" RULES:

- Corners NOT rounded, more angular definition
- Tapers to thin at ends

COLOR RULES:

- · Inner oviods ALWAYS black
- Primary black and secondary red, or vice versa.























