

Basic Lessons for the 4-H by Holly Moore

Strap cutting

The basic wooden strap cutter has a ruler built in. It is adjustable in several places according to how wide you want the strap to be and how wide the leather is (the leather's "weight"). The blade is dangerous, especially when first inserting it – BE CAREFUL!

Edging

Edgers are made in different sizes, according to how thick your leather is. The thicker the leather, the bigger the number edger you should use. The goal in edging is to "shave off" just a bit of the squared off edge you see after you've cut a piece of leather. Edging is usually one of the last steps, but can be done sooner.

Edge buffing or burnishing can be done with a slicker (round or long, with a groove for putting the leather in), a burnishing cloth (piece of burlap), or other similar tools. Some people also use beeswax or a product called gum tragacanth to make burnishing easier. It is enough to wet the edges of your project to burnish it. If both sides of the project are visible (front and back), you should edge and burnish both sides.

After burnishing and staining/dyeing your project, coat the edges with a product such as EdgeKote, many of which are available in applicator bottles.

Hardware/setting

I gave a basic lesson to leader Jan Martin, and also have acquired a complete set of tools for snap and rivet setting for the club. There are instructions in the setting kit box.

Dyes and Stains

 Commonly used stains are antiques like Tandy makes. These are put on thickly with a sponge or dauber, wait 5-10 minutes, and rub the excess off. They will sink into the low parts and look nice. Leather should be dry when stain is applied.

- Dyes are solid colors like Fiebings makes. They come in a wider variety of colors than antiques, but make the finished product all one shade. You apply them with a dauber while the leather is still damp.
- Fiebings also makes an antique paste. It is not as messy to apply as the Tandy antique, and looks like shoe polish. It is put on in a thick layer, then wiped off gently, leaving excess in the low spots. I like to put LexoINF on the project before using the paste, for some reason it works well that way.

<u>Dye techniques (resisting) & fin-</u> ishes

Resisting is done by applying (with a paintbrush) a finish such as LeatherShene to certain areas of your project before applying the dye. With some dyes you may need to use NeatLac as a resist – THIS MUST BE DONE OUTDOORS. NeatLac is extremely strong. Resisting leaves the coated parts of the project lighter than the rest.

Finishes come in many varieties. Some I've used are Aussie Wax and Leather Shene. Others are Satin Shene and NeatLac. Also, Fiebings Paste has a light finish built in, and doesn't require additional sealing. Even with finish, be careful of totally soaking leather.

Gouging on a fold

If you are making a project that has a fold

in it. like a binder.

you must gouge the line where it will fold to make it bend better. This must be done a little at a time or you will cut through too much leather.

Overstitch wheel, hole punching, and stitching

There are many different tools to make your time stitching easier. I will show you some, and you can choose what you will need based on your project. Be careful that the holes you punch match the type of stitching or lacing you want to do.

Wet forming

Leather can be soaked and shaped. When it is dry, it keeps the shape. You can make all kinds of flowers out of formed leather, and also masks and many other things. This is not something I've done yet, but hope to try soon.

Casing

Make sure your leather is neither too wet nor too dry. This can be hard to tell, I know. But either way, it will not take your work well. The leather should be almost back to its regular color, but still feel cool to the touch, before you work on it.

Swivel knife work

Be sure you're holding the knife right! This is the hardest thing in leathercraft, maybe other than beveling.

(ed. note: Holly adds some more information for those working with the youngsters.)

For what it may be worth, here's some other info I was passing along to folks yesterday about working with youth:

The favorite stain/dye in our 4H group was Fiebing's Antique Paste. It's easy to apply, and we used white socks to rub off excess and to buff. While it is not my personal favorite type of stain, it's handy for the group experience. It's also not too strong in an enclosed space. I've also used the other Fiebing's dyes with groups, but the trouble is cleanup. (Both on the kid and the tables should you spill any) I happen to LOVE Tandy antique stains, but they are probably the messiest and require water nearby.

I started a local group here in New Castle two months ago through our church. We hope to expand to the community. It varies from 4-7 kids right now, 4th grade and up. And some parents, too. I personally have enough of most everything to handle that size group (tools and stamps), but am looking to get another marble or two. Also, I was blessed by a member, who requested I not name him, with a long term loan of basic mallets, extra swivel knives, and a whole mess of patterns.

Our first project was rounders. You can get a good buy on the packs from TLF/Tandy. At least I do, because I have a sales tax ID so they put me in their makers/sellers club. I know you can "buy" a similar membership from HideCrafters, but I've not done that. The second class we did bookmarkers. Again, it was a group pack. The other advantage to group packs is you have lots of extras in case someone "flubs" up their attempts. We've focused on stamps right now. In the Fall when we begin again (after my baby is born) we'll be doing a little keyring/coin holder set and moving on from there to hopefully carved items. It's a mixed group: two girls are VERY talented, the others (a brother/sister set) are not quite as up on things yet.

Sheridan Color—Ron Ross Style

...under the "How I Carve" pictorial. You, or any other IILG member, may download those pictorials for your personal use.

But, I will give the procedure here also.

When you have completed your carving, let the leather dry completely. Then, apply a light coat of either pure **Neatsfoot Oil**, **Fiebing's Silicone Lanolin Saddle Oil** or, **pure virgin olive oil**, and let it dry in for several hours, preferably, overnight.

Next, apply two, light coats of **Tandy Neat-lac**, using a wool skin scrap and working the Neatlac in a circular motion. You do not want a lot of Neatlac on your woolskin.

You want to provide a resist, yet, you do not want to do a complete seal of the leather. After applying the Neatlac, let it sit for several or more hours.

Then, you are ready to apply a liberal coating of **Fiebing's Antique Paste**, in your favorite color. Really goop this on and smear it into the leather real well, to make sure that all bevels, cuts, tool impressions are covered.

Use the woolskin scrap to do this, as the wool fibers really get the paste into the cuts, etc. Then, wipe all of it off, using clean wool skin scrap. If the paste has started to dry, wipe it with the first piece, to loosen it, then, wipe off. Let this cure for several or more hours. Then, buff with a clean piece of wool skin, to be sure that there is no residue.

Lastly, apply a light finish of **Fiebings Tankote**, using the liquid sparingly and applying with a piece of woolskin scrap. Be sure to use a circular motion, as this helps prevent streaking. I work the finish until it is almost dry. That helps prevent streaking. Or, you may choose to use a coat of **Kiwi neutral shoe wax**, which, after it has dried to a dull lustre, can be buffed to a soft shene. Also, with the neutral shoe wax, there is no

risk of streaking.

For those who have not saved this procedure, why not print this off and put it with your other leather notes?

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Taking I-90

From Auburn: come north on Hwy167, or I-5, then I-405 north, then onto I-90, going east:

From Everett: South on I-5 to 405 South, or to I-90, going east:

From I-90 get off on exit 17/Front St., and bear right onto Front Street. At the third stoplight, turn left onto E Sunset Way, then see below:

<u>Taking Hwy 18 from around Auburn to Issaquah</u>

Get on Hwy 18 going East, from Auburn, it's about 12 miles to Maple Valley, then at about 2 ½ miles after Maple Valley, look for the turn off to Issaquah Hobart Rd SE, turn onto ramp 276th Ave SE and go 0.6 miles, bear left onto
