#### Reindeer fun

This picture is of reindeer my wife and I did last Christmas. We sent these to each family member with their initial on a leather medallion on gold (colored) wire

from the reindeer neck. Similar ones were popular at a **Past to Present Fair** I was at this weekend. Just something fun I made and are great stocking stuffers for all.

This is a pattern that was in an old **Tandy** Christmas sales flyer a long time ago when I was in San Diego. Sometime around 1991.


I use 2-3oz. vegetable tanned leather. Belly can be used if you use a thick layer of gum tragacanth to stiffen it so that the reindeer will stand. Otherwise a little "body" in the leather is helpful.



After I cut out the pattern get the leather real wet as if I were preparing it for tooling. I haven't tooled any of these so far but I see no reason why that couldn't happen if you wanted to. I made so many of them last year that I didn't want to take the additional time to tool them.

When the leather is wet I start shaping the legs. I bend the sides of the legs together with the flesh side out. If the leather isn't wet enough you will have a difficult time getting enough of a bend for stability. After the legs, I continue shaping the rest of the body and antlers. It's very easy and as the leather dries, the shape remains. The good

part is that if it doesn't come out right the first time then simply re wet the whole thing and try again.

Color them any way that suits you. I use an airbrush most of the time when I have several to color at one time. I've had requests for White Tail deer so the only difference there was I didn't paint the antlers gold and shaped the antlers a little wider. I have one in my

box of Xmas tree ornaments that I punched a small hole in the middle of the back with an awl and used gold wire to hang it with. Also I've omitted the antlers for does and made spikes for Rudolph and a red nose. Lots of fun, simple to make and always brings ooohs and aaahs at the craft fairs. If anyone has problems, please let me know and I'll do what I can to help out. Also, if anyone has suggestions of improvements, I would like

to hear those. Heck I just can't shut up. I know there are other patterns out there for other animals. I'm looking for them and would like to increase my zoo.


















#### **PSLAC October Meeting**

#### **Shibouri Leather Dye**

Paula Marquis' Shibouri Dye class was wonderful leather fun. This "surprise art" class was hosted at **General Seymour's** in Orting, WA.

Leather was scrunched, pleated, twisted, and tied with anything from rubber bands, twine, rope, chains, etc... letting your imagination be your guide! Some of the leather pieces were fastened around PVC pipe of various sizes with leaves and other objects wrapped into the design.

Paula brought her powdered dyes from Australia to mix with water for the dye process. The mixture was ladled over parts of the prepared leather. The ties were changed and the process repeated on newly tied areas using a different color. Fastenings were repeated as new colors were added for the design variations.

The delightful surprises came when all fastenings are off and the leather is allowed to dry. Like finger prints; no two pieces are the same.














#### **Cub Scouts**




the group played **Dusty Wert's Hide Game**—identifying various animal hides; while the others pounded their designs into cowhide leather pieces.
