tools. More details and a materials and tool list will be provided at the September 18 meeting. **Mark your calendar.** 




## **Lewis and Clark** Day Camp 2005



## **Sewing Finger Loops**


In last month's article on **Paula's** class, I mentioned finger loops to protect your fingers while sewing.

I found a piece of soft leather and made a pair, one of which I have taken a picture of and attached.

The pieces were cut 1 inch wide and wrapped around my little fingers and pinched closed at the top. I measured up 1/4 inch and marked it for cutting. I then sewed the loop closed. Measure each finger separately, as they may be different sizes. It took just a few minutes and I will get a lot of use out of them.

This was a soft, flexible piece of leather so I have not wet it as I indicated in last month's article.

## Leather Covered Wall Mounted Key Caddy Workshop



The workshop was at Len's home and was of 1-1/2 days duration. We all gathered at 9.00a.m. on Saturday 30th July.

We had a good turnout. Present were:

Len Madison (our Host)

George Senn

Paula Marquis (yours truly)

...and of course **Harry Smith** (who has a long way to come) and **Ken Eriksen** (who only has one leg and can't hop fast), they were late, but, we let them off the hook as they had good excuses.



My **George** also came, promising he wouldn't learn anything and he kindly went out and fetched lunch for everybody.

True to form we all gave Tony a hard time, but, he gallantly stuck it out. He gets 10 out of 10 for that!

Actually he did an excellent job. When we first heard we all thought a good beginners project, but, Tony

has brought it to new heights. The project was considerably involved and used a lot of advanced techniques.

Tony brought the wooden forms that we made our key caddies on. These were made of MDF (Medium Density Fiberboard) and he also supplied us with a name and address where we could get them if we wanted some.

The first phase consisted of moulding the base piece of leather onto the board. He had an interesting technique of moulding the corners without having a lot of excess leather at the corners to cut.



Then the first applique piece was prepared and put on top of the base leather, followed by the second shaped applique piece, which with our project was to have an initial centered. After that piece was prepared and cemented into place, we proceeded with our carving and stamping so that everything would fit together perfectly.

Tony showed us some interesting 'finessing' techniques to give the finished product a 'classy' look instead of a 'crafty' look.

To give the edges a finished look we put belting pieces around the sides.

This pretty much put us at the end of the day. The project now has a chance to thoroughly dry overnight and tomorrow comes the coloring and antiquing and putting on the finishing touches.

Tony was an excellent instructor, taking each section and showing how it was to be done and explaining why he did it the way he did.

It became obvious after a while that Tony did not come from Italian descent. When his mouth worked, his hands didn't and when his hands worked, his mouth didn't! Despite this little detriment he was very thorough.

He kept the class going smoothly and

had us all up to speed by the end of the day. I think it may be the first time I have been to a workshop and the whole class was finished at the same place. Good on ya' Tony!

Tony also brought some other samples of how these same techniques can be employed in things like frames and they would also work well for plaques and many other applications.

He also brought other pieces of work he'd done as samples to encourage us into pushing our limits. I will be taking photos as samples.

Sunday morning we all gathered in staggered groups, the early birds got started on their dyeing to make room for the late comers. The best I could do was get there just before 1.00p.m. and Ken Eriksen came shortly after me.

Dyeing was well on the way by the time I got there and that was good, as I could check out how the colors were coming and that made it easier



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for me to choose my color/antique combination.

Tony had the **Preval Spray Gun** for applying our oil based dyes on with and that worked really good. I'd seen these spray guns advertised in the **Tandy** catalogue many years ago, but, have never tried them. Now, of course, that I find out how good they are, Tandy doesn't sell them anymore. I have to find a supply somewhere else<sup>1</sup>. Tony did tell us that he is trying to get Tandy to market them again. I hope they do.

We all pretty much opted for different colors and in the end each of our projects had that individual look. I thought we'd all done a pretty good job and finished at a very high standard.

Of course, we were so busy admiring our good work that we forgot to get a group picture!!!! So now, will everybody that attended the class please bring their key caddy to the September meeting for a group photo and 'show and tell'.

I think we might have to get Tony back another time.



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**From Everett:** South on I-5 to 405 South, or to I-90, going east:

From I-90 get off on exit 17/Front St., and bear right onto Front Street. At the third stoplight, turn left onto E Sunset Way, then see below:

## <u>Taking Hwy 18 from around Auburn</u> <u>to Issaquah</u>

Get on Hwy 18 going East, from Auburn, it's about 12 miles to Maple Valley, then at about 2 ½ miles after Maple Valley, look for the turn off to Issaquah Hobart Rd SE, turn onto ramp 276th Ave SE and go 0.6 miles, bear left onto
