# Workshop Co-Ordinator's Report for July 2008

Summer is here and with no meetings for July and August our only contact is at the breakfasts and the Rawhide Gazette.

Our coloring workshop the day before the Picnic with **Jackie** went really well and we all took home some pretty good pieces of work, thanks to Jackie's excellent teaching.

At the end of June we had the all day workshop with **Paula Marquis** on making case and bag handles.

At the end of July we are going to have Paula's workshop on **Braiding a Dog Leash**—6 strands with a core. This will be at my home in Everett. For those who don't have the address, here it is: 4908 Harbor Lane, Everett. WA. 98203 - phone (425) 438 1709 (in case you get lost). Its an all day workshop from 9.00a.m. to 5.00p.m. For this workshop you will need to bring:

- •Kangaroo Lace (quantity depending on the length of the leash). Better to have too much than not enough - so about 1-1/2 times the length of the leash. That is for each strand, some extra length is needed for handle and turnbacks. Do not cut the lace ahead of time, this will be done at the workshop.
- •Fid
- Skiving knife
- 'C' clamp to anchor the braiding

Paula will bring some snaps of different sizes and conditioner for greasing up the strands and also some kangaroo lace in case somebody is short or does not have any.

At the beginning of August, Thursday 7th and Friday 8th we will have **Bob Beard** here to do the long awaited **Jewelled Scarab Beetle** project. This will also be at my home in Everett, again its all day 9.00a.m. to 5.00p.m.

Now for some unhappy news. Due to EXTREME pressure of work, **Peter Main** is unable to come to Seattle this year. Now for some happy news. **Chan Geer** has kindly stepped up to the plate and is coming to substitute for Peter. This will now be a three day workshop with Chan, Saturday 30th August, Sunday 31st August and Monday 1st September (1st September is a public


# Andy Stasiak is Back!

# **Sharpening a Splitter**

Dave Richards had a brand new splitter that was cutting the leather to be split—in half! Not the desired result.

Ivan Sampson carefully felt the new blade and it had a burr on the underside.

Dave cut a piece of 3/4-inch plywood and used barge cement to glue a 5/6-ounce vegetable tanned leather to the top. Trimming the leather to be flush with the plywood, Ivan rubbed white rouge all over the leather. Then, with protective heavy leather gloves he removed and stropped the blade

on the prepared leather until the burr was removed, then stropped additional times on top side and again on bottom side to polish the blade. Always stropping an even number of times so that the top and bottom





When completed the blade was replaced on the splitter with the edge directly over the center of the roller.

What a difference the sharpening and polishing made. Prefect splitting each time.

# **Sewing Machine Tune-up**

Ivan Sampson and I had the opportunity to visit with Dave Richards to look at a problem with an Artisan Sewing Machine. The machine was skipping stitches. Ivan

looked over the machine and noticed that the thread guide's fiber washer was dry and that the thread guide did not turn freely. It sort of felt like it had sand in it when turned by hand. Ivan first just oiled it and it turned more freely, but then we took it apart and cleaned, polished and replaced it and it felt like new

Next, Ivan started to oil the machine. The plate was removed from the needle mechanism and Ivan showed how to identify the oil points on the slides, cams and bushings. These are points that are not identified by the red colored oil points in the outside of the machine. This additional oil will cause some oil to appear on the leather when the machine is not used for some period of time, so Ivan suggests to leave a piece of leather under the foot to help soak up any extra oil and to run the machine on scrap before sewing on the project.

The exposed cams and bush-

ings on the rest of the machine also had oiling points that were not marked. It is difficult to describe, but the points were identified by small holes near a moving point that just need a drop of oil. My **Zoom** Spout Sewing Machine Oiler was perfect

for getting a small amount of oil in those tight spots. I picked up mine at C. H. Holderby in Seattle, but you can find it on-line at:

As Ivan looked at the needle plate he notice several scratches where

the needle, or something, had left areas of burrs that could interfere with smooth stitching. I was given the job to use some fine emery cloth (400 grit) to smooth out the needle plate and to make sure that the slot was even and clear on the hook side. The hook

side of the needle plate is important to help tighten the knot as the thread is pulled around the bobbin.

That side of the needle plate must also be

a business card thickness away from the needle when replacing the needle place. Dave will order a new needle plate from Artisan.

For initial tensioning of the top thread, Ivan puts the foot down to engage the tensions and grabs the thread and pulls. He says it should just about start to cut your finger as you pull the thread. Leave the bobbin tension alone.

Ivan finished by oiling the machine through all the red painted oiling points and Dave took the machine for test drive—perfect, no skipped stitches.

Ivan says: "Only use bonded thread and needle from Ferdco!"

Ivan Sampson brought pictures of his latest projects that generated a lot of questions on project construction and finishing details.

Since Ivan makes multiple items, he noticed something weird. When he dips the 2/3 ounce leather in the Fiebings Pro Oil Dve, the pieces that were laid grain side down verses grain side up were different colors—same dye, same side of leather. That is to say that the finished grain side was darker when the pieces were laid grain side up to dry.

A word to the wise—when dying multiple pieces lay them out the same side up for matched coloring.

Dave Richards brought a seat he sewed for Carla's Leather in Waitsburg. This is what prompted a long discussion on sewing machine tuning and the offer Ivan gave to go to the Artisan Sewing Machine that Dave owns and give it a check out.

Also, Herb showed a way to align basket




weave stamps to a boarder line. The idea is to form an equilateral triangle a "half stamp away from the boarder line. The ink lines on the stamping here show it basically. I think I'll need a refresher after Herb has recovered.

**Ron Ginder** brought in an Elk Rifle Scabbard that he made and that elk hide was sure a clean looking hide.









# Jackie's Leather Coloring Class

(First a confession: I was unable to attend the prerequisite class that carved the mountain scene, so Paula had one she did in preparation for the class she gave and in addition the one she did in class. Paula was kind enough to give me one to color for this class.)

On Saturday the 7th June, we gathered at General's home to paint the picture with **Jackie Holliday** at 9:00am. Jackie said

that we may not get this finished in the one day, but, will be far enough along to finish this at home. Jackie brought paints and some brought their own as well.

The students attending were: Paula Marquis, Bob Stelmack, Len Madison, Norm Lynds and Ken Eriksen. The Observers were: General and Ann Seymour, George Marquis, Woody Collins and a little dog.

Jackie had suggested the use of a couple of round brushes with a

good point for doing detail work #2 and something smaller and larger. Also some #4 and #6 Filbert brushes.

Jackie started us out by showing the sample she had done. First step was to paint the lightest colors first. She tried in impress on us that coloring needed to have differing values in the same area. Not like when you were in Kindergarten. The same color, same intensity, same hue and same coverage IS NOT what you need. Jackie pointed out that

the trees in General's back yard have many colors of green.

We all colored the same project, but they all looked different!

Here are some class notes she handed out:

### **RANDOM Paining Class Notes**

Suggest additives of GAC 100, plastic to help extend drying time.

SID (Support Induced Discoloration) When

varnishes are applied the resin soaks in and leaves the matting agent behind leaving a haze of marble dust. Best to seal the color with gloss before applying matt finish.



Carbone Glue Remover, Ink Remover.





# Taking Hwy 18 from around Auburn to Issaquah
