I had talked to Paula about doing a little bit more writing on the human ear demo that we did in December, but after reviewing the past few month RG's. I found that Norm had already done a great review of it in the January 2014 RG. I did want to point out one more thing from that demo that John Wickstrom and I noticed - on his human ear leather project, he was working with fairly thin leather and we noticed that the backside of his leather (picture on the left, reverse view) had nearly as much definition as the front side of his leather (below, front view).

Ear Carving Workshop Results

So, on to something new. At our April meeting John presented a challenge to the group. He had a small hand-held mirror with a wooden form between 2 layers of leather that held a small round mirror. He was looking for new ways to mount the mirror and then sew the outside edge. He showed us his 1st attempt, with a design on the back of it, but the design did not wind up being centered after he'd assembled it. One of his next efforts is pictured on this page, front and back and with the wooden form. For this one, he assembled and sewed it first. Then he did a swivel knife design on the back, but couldn't do any stamping for fear of breaking the mirror. So his challenged to us was: come up with different methods to get the pattern centered on the back, sew it evenly and close to the edge, and also ways to set the mirror so that it won't fall out. John had extra mirrors and wooden forms for us to try it out. We'll see what people come back with, in May and June

Teeth and Fangs

Teeth and fangs are very important in the lives of animals and people. Most animals and people have 2 sets of teeth

during their lives, the baby teeth which they are born with or come out shortly after birth, which they lose at a young age to be replaced by their adult teeth. Some fish,

like some sharks grow rows of teeth in back of the ones they are using to replace those lost during usage.

Teeth are divided into 3 different groups, incisors, canine, and molars. The front teeth are incisors, used for incising, or cutting the food. These, in people, are the front four teeth, both upper and lower. The next are the canine. These are used for gripping and piercing, one on each side, top and bottom. Following that are several sets of molars on both the top and bottom. These are used for chewing and grinding the food, or for crushing bones in the case of predators. Most vegetarian animals do not have the canine teeth, and some, such as cows and sheep do not have upper incisor. Many of the rodents, such as the beaver, incisor teeth constantly grow, and they have to keep using the teeth

to wear them down, otherwise, they grow to a length that prohibits the animal from eating and it will starve. The walrus also uses his very large canines for plowing the ocean bottom exposing the mollusks on which it feeds.

Watching those without upper teeth, cows, sheep, etc. they grip the food between their lower teeth and upper jaw and move their head in an upwars, sideways motion to cut the grass. Those with both upper and lowers, horses, etc. can move their head in any direction

to cut the food.

Predators use their canine teeth to grip and puncture their prey. Their jaws are tremendously powerful, and once locked almost nothing will make them relax until they are ready to, which usually means the victim is dead.

Teeth are not only used for gathering food and eating, they are also used as weapons during fighting. The after effects of these encounters can be seen in many of the wildlife and nature photos.

Look for the imperfections in the teeth. A April 2014 - Hide Side 3

perfect set of teeth can very seldom be seen in any adult, no matter the species.

Misalignment, chipped, missing, discolored, and crooked. All are present and should be represented





in the carving. Vertical lines and slight variations in the coloring may be seen.

During the carving, slight separation of the teeth from the lips should be shown by slightly rounding over of the lips. The tongue and inside of the mouth should be compressed and modeled to show depth, or the illusion of depth.

Various imperfections bring character to the subject. As with all carvings, attention to detail is paramount. I have found Bing to be a good source on the computer to do research. I have included a few pictures of various teeth and jaws as examples.



Directions to Cedar Grange #534:

From I-405 take the SR169 exit and proceed toward Maple Valley on the Maple Valley Highway. In about 10 Miles you will reach the SE 216th/SE 218th Street intersection. Turn Right onto SE 218th (the downsloping hill on the left next to the Maple Valley Market parking lot) towards the big white/gray building next to the bridge (the Cedar Grange). The parking lot is on the first left.

From Highway 18 take the SE 231st, Junction 169, Maple Valley exit. Proceed to the Highway 169 (Maple Valley Highway) junction. Turn North (toward Renton) on Highway 169 and go about 3/4 mile until you reach the SE 216th/SE 218th Street intersection. Turn left onto SE 218th (the down-sloping hill on the left next to the Maple Valley Market parking lot) towards the big white/gray building next to the bridge (the Cedar Grange). The parking lot is on the first left.

From Issaquah take Front Street toward Hobart and Highway 18. In about 10 miles get on Highway 18 West heading toward Maple Valley and Auburn. Follow the Highway 18 instructions.
