
This year, after asking questions from potential customers, I modified the plain square frame and added four other horizontal bars to display sample leather colors.

The April meeting workshop was great and Fred did a really good job in preparation and explaining and demonstrating the dry brush technique then spent the afternoon watching and assisting and encouraging us all.

For the May meeting we have convinced Ken Eriksen to show us how to make the tubes with lids that he uses for a lot of his Mountain Man articles. The tube containers are useful for all sorts of things and can be made to any size and purpose that one want to use it for, such as storing awls, sewing needles, lacing needles and if made a little taller are good for putting in stamping tools to take to workshops, etc.

We probably won't get the project done in May, but, it can be continued in July. I can hear you asking what happened to June, but, in case anybody forgot, June is our Annual Picnic/Garage Sale/eating and socializing day.

Following is a list of items to bring in May:

- Tooling leather piece at lease 8" x 3-1/2" or 4" of minimum 8oz. (Larger piece of leather if you want to make the piece taller than 4". Also, longer piece of leather if working with a larger than 2" diameter.)
- Any kind of round dowell with a 2" diameter.
- Awl (Ken will bring curved awls for anybody who wants to try them.)
- Rubber push block
- Cutting Board and sharp knife
- Ruler
- Thread, needles, awl, stitching clamp (just in case)
- Pricking Iron or Stitch Marking Wheel
- · Stitching Grover
- Contact Cement
- Tooling block, water container and sponge
- Mallet
- Geometric stamps for a simple pattern. Also border tool and swivel knife.

Ken will bring patterns for the container.

I think that covers everything and it's looking to be a good workshop.

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
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Meeting Directions to Cedar Grange #534

From I-405 take the SR169 exit and proceed toward Maple Valley on the Maple Valley Highway. In about 10 Miles you will reach the SE 216th/SE 218th Street intersection. Turn Right onto SE 218th (the downsloping hill on the left next to the Maple Valley Market parking lot) towards the big white/gray building next to the bridge (the Cedar Grange). The parking lot is on the first left.

From Highway 18 take the SE 231st, Junction 169, Maple Valley exit. Proceed to the Highway 169 (Maple Valley Highway) junction. Turn North (toward Renton) on Highway 169 and go about ¾ mile until you reach the SE 216th/SE 218th Street intersection. Turn left onto SE 218th (the downsloping hill on the left next to the Maple Valley Market parking lot) towards the big white/gray building next to the bridge (the Cedar Grange). The parking lot is on the first left.

From Issaquah take Front Street toward Hobart and Highway 18. In about 10 miles get on Highway 18 West heading toward Maple Valley and Auburn. Follow the Highway 18 instructions.
